Curriculum

Assessment & reporting

Pupils' achievement is closely monitored and the pastoral and academic teams work closely with pupils and parents, aiming to ensure that pupils reach their full potential and needs or issues are addressed in partnership and in the best interest of students.


Key Stage 4

Post 16

Enrichment and outreach opportunities will ensure that their thinking skills and personal capabilities are fully developed and that young, dynamic and capable problem solvers and communicators are ready to commence the next chapter of their lives.

Our Post 16 Students are offered enrichment opportunities as Faith Friends, Justice & Peace activists, helpers in The Men's Shed project or links to Sperrinview Special School, as well as pupil leadership and mentoring opportunities. We also co-ordinate Pope John Paul and Millenium Volunteer Awards. These engagements provide the platform for a love for neighbour, respect for the dignity of all, a desire for equality, practicing inclusion and a lived service to those in need.

Pastoral Care

A storal Care is at the centre of our school ethos. It gives us great pride to nurture and support our students, to ensure their personal, emotional and intellectual development and well-being.

The Head of Pastoral Care is Mrs B Loughran. Each Key Stage is led by a Head of School and each Year Group is led by a Head of Year while each Form Class is supported by a Form Teacher, as well as Head of Year and Head of Junior School. We recognise the importance of peer support and so

Our vision is to establish a school community where each individual is nurtured and cared for, where the student voice is valued, where parents are embraced as partners and where the academic, emotional, cultural and social well-being of our youth is of paramount concern. Our aim is to care for the whole child. We are not just focused on academic outcomes, but on ensuring that our students are engaged, happy, celebrated, encouraged and inspired. We recognise that students have a right to feel safe and secure; therefore Safeguarding is at the heart of our work.



SEN

S pecial Education provision requires an assurance that all children will be learning and achieving to their highest potential.

The SENCO is Mrs B Loughran and Assistant SENCO is Miss E McCarron. Their role is to help remove barriers to learning and ensure pupils with any additional needs are fully enabled and supported.

We offer a range of Learning Support Programmes in small group and one to one settings, including Literacy, Numeracy, English as an Additional Language and Social Skills Programmes.

On a daily basis, pupils with SEN are supported in lessons by Classroom Assistants, who ensure that the curriculum is accessible. Identified pupils with SEN needs also have access to one to one support to ensure their engagement and success.

Transition Programmes

The transition from primary to post primary and between the Key Stages are times when our pupils need to be supported effectively. All our pupils have an induction programme at the start of each academic year and induction evenings are organised for parents. We have a Primary School Links Co-ordinator who works with students in local primary schools to welcome them into St Patrick's College and share experiences of life here in advance of transition into Year 8.

Learning Support & Mentoring

I n St Patrick's College we have developed a unique Learning Support Programme which provides the basis for interviews and lessons with individual students to facilitate engagement and achievement, removing barriers to learning. Students benefit from one to one support and relationships with a member of staff who will champion and encourage them to be their best.

Our Lead Mentor is Mr Cathal Meegan and he is supported by the Assistant SENCO Miss E McCarron. they have developed a programme to support students in their academic development, wellbeing and self esteem. This Programme takes account of needs, interests, strengths and aspirations of all, so that an ethos of high expectation can result in high standards.

BT Young Scientist

ey Stage 3 pupils had a fantastic experience at the BTYS event in the RDS in January 2020. For a school team even to get selected to actually participate in the event is quite a feat. More than 1800 entries are narrowed down to 550 stands. Our Team of 3 pupils entered the Junior Chemical, Physical and Mathematical category and secured a 3 place outcome – an amazing achievement.

The aim of this project was to investigate whether the level of oil in foundation led to an increase in acne cosmetica. Acne cosmetica is a term describing acne caused by the use of cosmetics and is common among adolescent and adult women. The students chose six foundations based on their ingredients to test. They also issued questionnaires to groups of peers and completed the surveys, on skin type and foundation use. After analysing the results from the practical experiment, the students concluded that Fenty beauty actually caused the lowest percentage increase in the mass.

Well done to Gaudvile, Goda and Kate who had a wonderful experience presenting their research and findings and convincing the judges of the merits of their project!

This year two teams will enter the Technology Junior Category. A Key Stage 3 Team has created an SEN Cube with different sided textures to identify the impact on focus and concentration. The Key Stage 4 Team have entered the Biological & Ecological Intermediate category with a Reaction Test.

We look forward to hearing about thier journey this year!

We were delighted to be the first school in N Ireland to be recognised as a TES UK Entrepreneurial School.

Minister Weir visited the school to present the award and acknowledged the range of business links and partnerships we have established.

As a school community we are focused on ensuring students hear from leaders, innovators and creators so that they become self-reflective, motivated young people who are ready to take up their place as full contributors in the working world of the 21st Century. We are focused on offering events that build flexible and critical thinkers, so that students value the importance of collaboration, taking risks and realising the value in lifelong learning. This award was a recognition of the breadth of work that takes place across the school.

This year our Post 16 Young Enterprise Company 'People of Culture' secured best new company in the Big Market.

Year 8 company ideas were presented to a Dragons Den event for investment, including Carol Fitzsimons from YE NI.

Student Leaders

Digital Leaders

The Digital Leaders are the ambassadors for all things digital and technology related within the College.

They are responsible for running the popular Computing Club, assisting the ICT technicians, delivering presentations, workshops and advice on internet safety and being on hand to help other pupils and teachers with ICT problems.

Their plans include everything from entering cyber security competitions, creating promos for the College and establishing a weekly blog and ICT clinic.

This year the Digital Leaders entered a FirstTech Competition to build a Robot. This was an opportunity for pupils to work alongside a mentor from Terex and the Robot was successful in securing 3rd place for the Team in N Ireland and are due to go forward to the UK competition.



Student Council

St Patrick's College prides itself on being a Rights Respecting School where every person is valued. Our Student Council is made up of representatives from every year group who attend monthly council meetings. Our Student Voice is important to us and they discuss a wide range of issues that impact the daily lives of our students. The issues are brought forward to our Senior Management Team and Board of Governors who work with the students to ensure they are listened to.

We seek feedback from students throughout the school year on learning, teaching and pastoral support in an ongoing focus to raise standards and the student experience.











Eco Team

The Eco Team at St Patrick's College works hard to ensure all pupils are aware of their responsibility to keep St Patrick's College tidy and establish a welcoming environment for all. Pupils have taken part in litter picks and competitions such as 'The Young Reporters for the Environment'. Previously, pupils produced a winning entry for this competition, gaining £250 for the school. Our Eco Team also work in partnership with our STEAM Team, recycling waste and organically growing fruit and vegetables. Their hard work and commitment enabled us to achieve the Green Flag! The Eco Team meet weekly to keep the front of the school and the Garden of Hope full of colour and vibrancy.









Steam Team

The STEAM Team was set up in St Patrick's College at the beginning of the academic year 2015 - 2016. The team was set up as part of an extended schools project involving our pupils and staff working with pupils from local primary schools. The team has grown from strength to strength and due to its popularity, the team now meet after school for two days every week.

A polytunnel was erected at St Patrick's College at the beginning of the project and since then, pupils have continually grown and harvested a range of fruit and vegetables with the help of expertise from staff from Willowbank Resource Centre, Pupils have been able to develop their understanding of growing their produce as well as enhancing their knowledge of how best to make a profit on their produce. Last year, pupils sold their produce at school events and at Dungannon Enterprise Centre, Funds from this financed two school trips for the pupils to CAFRE and a Women in Engineering Event at W5. Additionally, pupils have used some of their produce to create healthy dishes in the Home Economics department and have made Pumpkin Soup with members from the Rotary Club. Overall, the STEAM Team activities have provided wonderful opportunities to develop enterprise, teamwork, leadership and communication skills.

As part of the projects delivered, pupils have been able to display their creativity by creating a large clay piece for the Big Bear Woods at Windmill Integrated Primary School, frog sculptures from used tyres, raised beds for Edendork and Newmills Primary Schools and picnic benches for our school. Much of this work has been completed with help from representatives from Dungannon Men's Shed. Pupils have also produced Christmas crafts and sold these at local craft fayres. Once again, this has allowed pupils opportunities to develop numeracy and communication skills.

In order to encourage pupils to further their digital technology skills, an area which expects great growth in the near future, iCovers have delivered workshops which allowed pupils to understand the work carried out by iCovers staff on a daily basis. Pupils have also taken part in Sentinus 'flight' and coding workshops. The afterschool STEAM Team has been invaluable in allowing our pupils to develop key transferable employability skills such as problem solving, creativity and teamwork. For this reason, we have now introduced STEAM activities onto our timetable for some Year 8-10 classes. This has involved these pupils taking part in the Shipping Container Upcycle project, Engineering projects and our Year 10 group are working with Dungannon Men's Shed and a mosaic artist to manufacture park benches which will be placed in the new Community Garden in Dungannon.

Careers

ur focus is on empowering students with the knowledge to make the best choices at the most important time in their career.

Pupils have access to a wide range of career events both inside and outside the school and are provided with comprehensive careers information, guidance and advice. Our pupils have opportunities to sample the world of work via our work placement schemes and we have a teacher appointed to visit pupils on such placements and establish meaningful links for their future employment prospects.

Each year students from Year 10 - Year 14 have an opportunity to visit a business or industry linked to their future career aspirations. Over 350 students visit up to 18 company's to gain an insight into the world of work.

Individual career guidance is a major part of the work of the careers department and is available to all pupils. All Year 14 students are given expert coaching and guidance on how to complete their university application to help ensure successful entry.

Our Head of Careers works closely with the Department of Education and Learning and a Careers Officer from the Department visits the school on a regular basis to offer guidance and support to our students.

Local employers have input into our careers programme and help develop skills required for working life.


